- 1.1 This First Supplemental Prospectus is issued to reflect the amendments made to the Prospectus as stated under paragraph 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 below.
- 1.2 All terms used in this First Supplemental Prospectus shall have the same meanings as those defined in the Definitions Chapter of the Prospectus unless where the context otherwise requires.
- 1.3 All information provided herein is practicable as at 31 January 2021 and shall remain current and relevant as at such date.

### 2.0. ABOUT THIS DOCUMENT

### 3.0. FUND INFORMATION

- 3.1. The information under the section of “**Investment policy and Principal Investment Strategy**” at page 1 and 2 has been replaced and read as below:

The Fund will be managed with the aim to provide investors with income and capital appreciation over the medium to long term through investments in the Asia Pacific ex Japan region. The Fund seeks to achieve its investment objective through a diversified portfolio investment in equities, debt securities, money market instruments and/or Deposits. The investment in debt securities and money market instruments is to provide some capital stability to the Fund whilst the investment in equity portion will provide the added return in a rising market. The Fund may invest in Deposits for liquidity purpose.

The Fund may invest up to 100% of its NAV in equities, debt securities or money market instruments and Deposits with financial institutions. The Sub-Manager has the flexibility to determine its asset allocation between different asset classes according to their views on the prevailing market condition. For example, they may invest up to 100% of the NAV in debt securities and liquid assets in the volatile market to preserve value of the Fund or they can invest up to 100% of the NAV in equities with the aim to generate added return in rising market. The Fund's investment in debt securities will generally be restricted to at least a minimum credit rating of “BBB” by S&P or equivalent rating by any other international rating agencies. Nonetheless, the Fund may also invest up to 20% of the Fund's NAV in non-investment grade and unrated debt securities with effect from 14 May 2021.

At our discretion, the Fund may opt to access into the equities and/or debt securities market via the investment in units of other CIS, subject to the requirements of the SC Guidelines and the Standards of Qualifying CIS. When deemed necessary, we or the Sub-Manager may also utilize derivative instruments such as futures contracts and currency forwards to hedge the portfolio, subject to the prevailing SC Guidelines and Standards of Qualifying CIS.

The Fund will invest primarily in the Asia Pacific ex Japan region, i.e. companies that are domiciled in, listed in, and/or have operations or businesses that focus in the Asia Pacific ex Japan region. With effect from 14 May 2021, the Fund may also invest up to 20% of its NAV in companies that are listed globally with some operations or businesses within the Asia Pacific ex Japan region to capture growth opportunities. The Fund will only invest in markets where the regulatory authority is an ordinary or associate member of the IOSCO. If the investment is a listed security, the investment must be traded in an exchange that is a member of WFE. Where necessary, we or the Sub-Manager will obtain the licenses/permits for investments in countries that require such licenses/permits. In the event that we are unable to obtain the necessary approvals, licenses or permits, or the approval, licenses or permits are revoked or not renewed (as the case may be), we or the Sub-Manager will seek to invest in other accessible markets.

The asset allocation strategy for this Fund is as follows:

- Up to 100% of the Fund's NAV will be invested in equities, debt securities or money market instruments and Deposits with financial institutions. The Fund may also invest in non-investment grade and unrated debt securities, but subject to a maximum of 20% of its NAV.

We have appointed Principal Singapore as the Sub-Manager of the Fund. Principal Singapore will be responsible for investing and managing the equities portion, debt portion and asset allocation of the Fund in accordance with the

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investment objective and within the investment restrictions. For debt portion, we will work with the Sub-Manager in the overall due diligence and debt selection process. For further details on the Sub-Manager, please refer to page 22.

The asset allocation will be reviewed periodically depending on the country's economic and stock market outlook. The Sub-Manager will adopt an active trading strategy with frequency that will depend on the market conditions and the market outlook. The Sub-Manager will be especially selective in the buying and selling of securities for the Fund. For the equities portion, The Sub-Manager combine a top-down asset and sector allocation process with a bottom-up stock selection process. The asset allocation decision is made after a review of macroeconomic trends in Asia Pacific ex Japan region and other global economies. In particular, the Sub-Manager analyzes the direction of GDP growth, interest rates, inflation, currencies and government policies. The Sub-Manager will then assess their impact on corporate earnings and determine if there are any predictable trends. These trends form the basis for sector selection. Stock selection is based on the growth style of equity investing. As such, the criteria for stock selection would include improving fundamentals and growth at reasonable valuations. Stock valuation fundamentals considered are earnings per share growth rate, return on equity, price earnings ratio and net tangible assets multiples.

As for the debt securities portion, we or the Sub-Manager formulate an interest rate outlook by considering factors such as the inflation rate, monetary policies and economic growth. With an interest rate outlook and yield curve analysis, we or the Sub-Manager identify the weighting of the investment tenure and credit for the Fund. Generally, we or the Sub-Manager will manage risks associated with debt securities portfolio according to three (3) parameters: tenure, credit ratings and sector. The duration of the debt securities portfolio is also monitored and modified according to our interest rate outlook (i.e. the sensitivity of the portfolio to interest rate changes). In the unlikely event of a credit rating downgrade of the debt securities or its issuers, we or the Sub-Manager reserve the right to deal with the security in the best interest of the Unit holders. As an active fund manager, we or the Sub-Manager have in place flexible tolerance limits to cater to such situations. We can for example, continue to hold the downgraded security if the immediate disposal of the security would not be in the best interest of the Unit holders.

In times of adversity in equity markets and as part of its risk management strategy, we or the Sub-Manager may from time to time reduce its proportion of equities and increase its asset allocation to liquid assets such as money market instruments and/or Deposits to safeguard the investment portfolio of the Fund. When deemed necessary, we or the Sub-Manager may also utilize derivative instruments, subject to the SC Guidelines and Standards of Qualifying CIS, for purpose of hedging. In the event of a downgrade of a counter-party of an OTC derivative below the minimum long-term rating as per the SC Guidelines, we reserve the right to deal with the OTC derivative in the best interest of the Unit holders.

Further, risk management, with an emphasis on portfolio diversification, will form an integral part of the investment process. The Fund is constructed and managed within guidelines including risk returns trade-off, which will be monitored and reviewed regularly by the investment management team. The risk management strategies and techniques employed include diversification of the Fund's asset allocation in terms of its exposure to various sectors, industries and companies.

If the Fund is eligible to be invested via the EPF-MIS, investments made by the Fund will be subject to the EPF's requirements. Please note that there may be changes to the status of the eligibility of the Fund under the EPF-MIS from time to time. #### 4.0. RISK FACTORS

4.1. The information under the section of "**Credit and default risk**" at page 5 and 6 has been replaced and read as below:

The Fund will be exposed to a certain degree of credit and default risk of issuers or counterparties when the Fund invests in debt securities, money market instruments and/or place Deposits. Credit risk relates to the creditworthiness of the securities issuers or counterparties and their expected ability to make timely payment of interest and/or principal. Any adverse situations faced by the issuer or counterparties may impact the value as well as liquidity of the investments. In the case of rated debt securities, this may lead to a credit downgrade. Default risk relates to the risk that a securities issuer or counterparties either defaulting on payments or failing to make payments in a timely manner which will in turn adversely affect the value of the investments. This could adversely affect the value of the Fund. Should the Fund invest in non-investment grade debt securities, the Fund is subject to a higher default risk as compared to a fund that invests in investment grade debt securities only. We aim to mitigate this risk by performing bottom-up and top down credit research and analysis to determine the creditworthiness of its issuers or counterparties, and impose investment limits on exposures for issuers or counterparties with different credit profiles as a precautionary step to limit any loss that may arise directly or indirectly as a result of a defaulted transaction.

**Taxation of the unit trust fund and unit holders**

This letter has been prepared for inclusion in this First Supplemental Prospectus in connection with the offer of units in the unit trust known as Principal Asia Pacific Dynamic Mixed Asset Fund (hereinafter referred to as “the Fund”).

The purpose of this letter is to provide prospective unit holders with an overview of the impact of taxation on the Fund and the unit holders.

**Taxation of the Fund**

The taxation of the Fund is subject to the provisions of the Malaysian Income Tax Act 1967 (MITA), particularly Sections 61 and 63B.

Subject to certain exemptions, the income of the Fund comprising profits and other investment income derived from or accruing in Malaysia after deducting tax allowable expenses, is subject to Malaysian income tax at the rate of 24% with effect from the year of assessment 2016.

Tax allowable expenses would comprise expenses falling under Section 33(1) and Section 63B of the MITA. Section 33(1) permits a deduction for expenses that are wholly and exclusively incurred in the production of gross income. In addition, Section 63B allows unit trusts a deduction for a portion of other expenses (referred to as ‘permitted expenses’) not directly related to the production of income, as explained below.

“Permitted expenses” refer to the following expenses incurred by the Fund which are not deductible under Section 33(1) of the MITA:

- the manager's remuneration,
- maintenance of the register of unit holders,
- share registration expenses,
- secretarial, audit and accounting fees, telephone charges, printing and stationery costs and postage.

These expenses are given a partial deduction under Section 63B of the MITA, based on the following formula:

$$A \times \frac{B}{4C}$$

where

A is the total of the permitted expenses incurred for that basis period;

B is gross income consisting of dividend<sup>1</sup>, interest and rent chargeable to tax for that basis period; and

- C is the aggregate of the gross income consisting of dividend<sup>1</sup> and interest (whether such dividend or interest is exempt or not) and rent, and gains made from the realisation of investments (whether chargeable to tax or not) for that basis period,

provided that the amount of deduction to be made shall not be less than 10% of the total permitted expenses incurred for that basis period.

### Exempt income

The following income of the Fund is exempt from income tax:

- **Malaysian sourced dividends**

All Malaysian-sourced dividends should be exempt from income tax.

- **Malaysian sourced interest**

- (i) interest from securities or bonds issued or guaranteed by the Government of Malaysia;
- (ii) interest from debentures or *sukuk*, other than convertible loan stock, approved or authorized by, or lodged with, the Securities Commission;
- (iii) interest from Bon Simpanan Malaysia issued by Bank Negara Malaysia;
- (iv) interest derived from Malaysia and paid or credited by banks licensed under the Financial Services Act 2013 or the Islamic Financial Services Act 2013<sup>2</sup>;
- (v) interest derived from Malaysia and paid or credited by any development financial institution prescribed under the Development Financial Institutions Act 2002<sup>2</sup>;
- (vi) interest from *sukuk* originating from Malaysia, other than convertible loan stock, issued in any currency other than Ringgit and approved or authorized by, or lodged with, the Securities Commission or approved by the Labuan Financial Services Authority (LFSA)<sup>3</sup>; and
- (vii) interest which is specifically exempted by way of statutory orders or any other specific exemption provided by the Minister.

- **Discount**

Tax exemption is given on discount paid or credited to any unit trust in respect of investments as specified in items (i), (ii) and (iii) above.

### Foreign sourced income

Dividends, interest and other income derived from sources outside Malaysia and received in Malaysia by a resident unit trust is exempt from Malaysian income tax. However, such income may be subject to tax in the country from which it is derived.

### Gains from the realisation of investments

Pursuant to Section 61(1) (b) of the MITA, gains from the realisation of investments will not be treated as income of the Fund and hence, are not subject to income tax. Such gains may be subject to real property gains tax (RPGT) under the Real Property Gains Tax Act 1976 (RPGT Act), if the gains are derived from the disposal of chargeable assets, as defined in the RPGT Act.

### Implementation of Sales and Service Tax (“SST”)

Sales and Service Tax (“SST”) was re-introduced effective 1 September 2018. Sales Tax of 10% (most common rate) or 5% is charged by Malaysian manufacturers of taxable goods or upon importation into Malaysia of such taxable goods, unless specifically exempted under the Sales Tax (Goods Exempted From Tax) Order 2018. Service Tax at the

rate of 6% is charged on certain prescribed taxable services performed by taxable persons as stipulated under Service Tax Regulations 2018. The input tax recovery mechanism under the previous GST regime does not apply to SST. Therefore, any SST incurred is not recoverable and will form a cost element for businesses.

Based on the Service Tax Regulations 2018, a unit trust fund is neither regarded as a taxable person nor as providing taxable services and is therefore not liable for SST registration. Where the Fund incurs expenses such as management fees, the management services provided by asset and fund managers are specifically excluded from the scope of Service Tax. As for other fees, such as trustee fees and other administrative charges, these may be subject to 6% service tax provided they fall within the scope of service tax (i.e. are provided by a “taxable person”, who exceeds the required annual threshold (in most cases RM 500,000 per annum) and the services qualify as “taxable services”).

### Taxation of unit holders

For Malaysian income tax purposes, unit holders will be taxed on their share of the distributions received from the Fund.

The income of unit holders from their investment in the Fund broadly falls under the following categories:

1. taxable distributions; and
2. non-taxable and exempt distributions.

In addition, unit holders may also realise a gain from the sale of units.

The tax implications of each of the above categories are explained below:

#### 1. Taxable distributions

Distributions received from the Fund will have to be grossed up to take into account the underlying tax paid by the Fund and the unit holder will be taxed on the grossed up amount.

Such distributions carry a tax credit, which will be available for set-off against any Malaysian income tax payable by the unit holder. Should the tax deducted at source exceed the tax liability of the unit holder, the excess is refundable to the unit holder.

Please refer to the paragraph below for the income tax rates applicable to the grossed up distributions.

#### 2. Non-taxable and exempt distributions

Tax exempt distributions made out of gains from the realisation of investments and exempt income earned by the Fund will not be subject to Malaysian income tax in the hands of the unit holders.

### Rates of tax

The Malaysian income tax chargeable on the unit holders would depend on their tax residence status and whether they are individuals, corporations or trust bodies. The relevant income tax rates are as follows:

Non-resident unit holders may be subject to tax in their respective countries depending on the provisions of the tax legislation in the respective countries and any existing double taxation arrangements with Malaysia.

**Gains from sale of units**

Gains arising from the realisation of investments will generally not be subject to income tax in the hands of unit holders unless they are insurance companies, financial institutions or traders / dealers in securities.

**Unit splits and reinvestment of distributions**

Unit holders may also receive new units as a result of unit splits or may choose to reinvest their distributions. The income tax implications of these are as follows:

- Unit splits – new units issued by the Fund pursuant to a unit split will not be subject to income tax in the hands of the unit holders.
- Reinvestment of distributions – unit holders may choose to reinvest their income distribution in new units by informing the Manager. In this event, the unit holder will be deemed to have received the distribution and reinvested it with the Fund.

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We hereby confirm that, as at the date of this letter, the statements made in this letter correctly reflect our understanding of the tax position under current Malaysian tax legislation and the related interpretation and practice thereof, all of which are subject to change, possibly on a retrospective basis. We have not been retained (unless specifically instructed hereafter), nor are we obligated to monitor or update the statements for future conditions that may affect these statements.

The statements made in this letter are not intended to be a complete analysis of the tax consequences relating to an investor in the Fund.
