MANAGER'S REPORT

FUND OBJECTIVE AND POLICY

What is the investment objective of the Fund?

The Fund aims to maximise total return through investments in one collective investment scheme, which invests primarily in assets of the Emerging Markets ("EM").

Has the Fund achieved its objective?

For the financial year under review, the Fund has not achieved its objective. However, we are taking necessary action to ensure that the Fund is in line to achieve its long-term objective as stated under the Investment Objective section.

What are the Fund investment policy and principal investment strategy?

The Fund is a feeder fund and it invests in a single collective investment scheme, i.e. AllianceBernstein Société d'Investissement à Capital Variable ("AB SICAV") I Emerging Markets Multi-Asset Portfolio ("Target Fund"). The Fund may also invest in liquid asset for liquidity purpose.

In order to achieve its investment objective, the Fund will invest at least 95% of its Net Asset Value ("NAV") in the Target Fund; a Undertaking for Collective Investment in Transferable Securities ("UCITS") domiciled in Luxembourg and established on 23 May 2011. Currently, the Fund will invest in Class AD of the Target Fund, which is a share class denominated in USD and launched on 21 March 2013. The Fund will also maintain up to 5% of its NAV in liquid assets for liquidity purposes. The Fund may invest into any other classes of the Target Fund which must be denominated in USD if the Manager and the Target Fund Manager are of the opinion that the change is in the interest of the Unit holders.

Asset Allocation

- At least 95% of the Fund's NAV will be invested in the Target Fund; and
- Up to 5% of the Fund's NAV will be invested in liquid assets for liquidity purposes.

What is the Fund's benchmark?

The Fund is benchmark unconstrained as the Target Fund is benchmark unconstrained i.e. it will be actively managed without references to any specific benchmark.

What is the Fund distribution policy?

Quarterly, depending on the availability of realised income and/or realised gains and at the Manager's discretion. The Manager has the right to make provisions for reserves in respect of distribution of the Class. If the income available is too small or insignificant, any distribution may not be of benefit to unit holders as the total cost to be incurred in any such distribution may be higher than the amount for distribution. The Manager has the discretion to decide on the amount to be distributed. The Manager also has the discretion to make income distribution on an ad-hoc basis, taking into consideration the level of its realised income and/or realised gains, as well as the performance of the Fund.

What was the net income distribution for the financial year ended to 31 January 2023?

The Fund distributed a total net income of USD0.32 million to unit holders for the financial year ended 31 January 2023.

MARKET REVIEW (1 FEBRUARY 2022 TO 31 JANUARY 2023)

EM equities, as measured by the Morgan Stanley Capital International ("MSCI") EM Index, declined 7.0% during the first quarter of 2022 (in USD terms). Stocks experienced periods of increased volatility against a backdrop of tightening monetary policy particularly in the US, geopolitical turmoil triggered by Russia's invasion of Ukraine, and surging Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("COVID-19") cases in China, which prompted the renewal of strict lockdowns in some cities. Inflation continued to accelerate, threatening the global economic recovery as commodity price shocks and global supply-chain woes worsened as a result of the war.

During the second quarter of 2022, EM stocks, as measured by the MSCI EM Index, declined 11.5%; year to date, the index has lost 17.6%. The global economic outlook deteriorated sharply in the second quarter as the growing risk of recession especially in the US accelerated amid persistently high inflation. Central bankers, led by the US Federal Reserve (the "Fed"), responded with aggressively tighter monetary policy. The impact of rising energy prices on the cost of living, worsened by Russia's move to reduce energy supplies to parts of Europe; and escalating supply-chain disruptions related to China's pledge to enforce its zero-COVID-19 strategy weighed heavily on risk sentiment and fueled investor concern about the growing risk of recession.

EM equities, as measured by the MSCI EM Index, closed down 0.3% in July 2022, underperforming developed markets which rallied in the month amid a recalibration of rate-hike expectations on the back of softer economic data. In contrast, concerns over China's economic woes and weak commodity prices weighed on EMs. Year to date, the MSCI EM has declined 17.8% (all returns in US-dollar terms).

The MSCI EM Index, rose modestly in August 2022, but struggled for direction throughout the month. EMs were weighed down by worries over global growth exacerbated by the Fed increasingly hawkish commentary, a worsening economic slowdown in China, escalating US-China tension around Taiwan and weaker commodity prices. Despite this, EM equities outperformed developed markets ("DM"s), which fell in the month. The MSCI EM Index closed up 0.4%; year to date, the index has lost 17.5% (all returns in US-dollar terms).

EM equities, as measured by the MSCI EM Index, declined 11.6% in September 2022; year to date, the index has lost 27.2% (all returns in USD terms), though the continued strength of the USD mitigated losses for most investors with non-USD based currencies. The global economic outlook continued to deteriorate. Increasingly hawkish central banks and persistent inflation elevated investor concern that rapidly rising borrowing costs would slow economic growth significantly and tip global economies including that of the US into recession.

Global equities rallied throughout much of the fourth quarter as investor sentiment was boosted by early evidence of easing inflationary pressures, which raised hopes that the Fed and other key central banks would soon slow the pace of rate hikes. Equities gave back gains late in the quarter as optimism faded after the Fed downshifted to a 0.50% rate hike but strongly reaffirmed its conviction for higher-for-longer rates. EM stocks, as measured by the MSCI EM Index, rose 9.7% during the fourth quarter of 2022 and lost 20.1% for the full year (all returns in USD terms).

EM equities experienced a solid gain during the month of January 2023. The MSCI EM Index rose 7.9%, in USD terms, amid optimism over the potential for a strong economic rebound in China following the end of zero-COVID-19 restrictions and cooling inflation in the US, which may lead to a less hawkish Fed. A weaker US dollar also benefited EM equities.

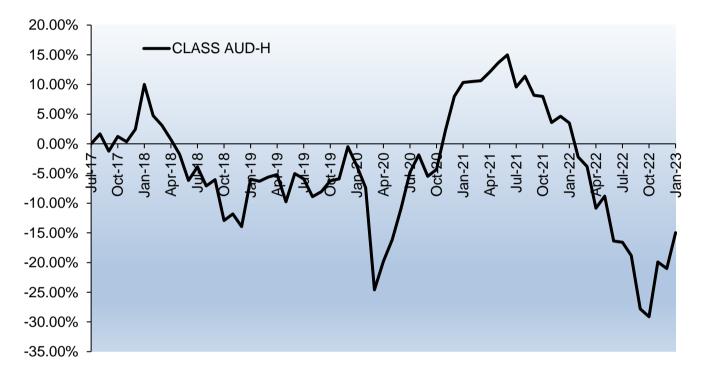

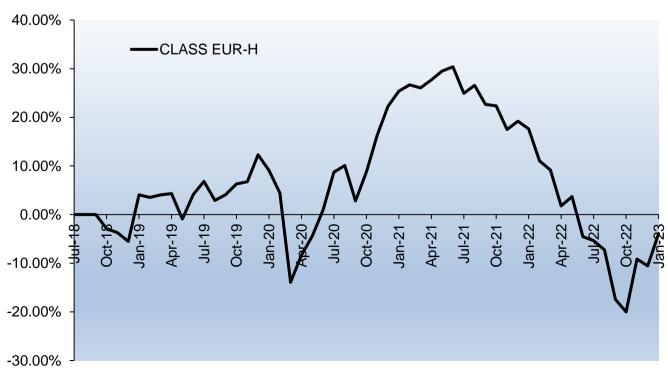

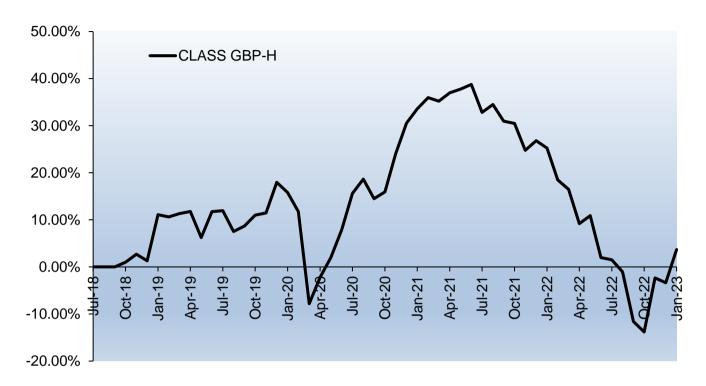


CLASS EUR-H

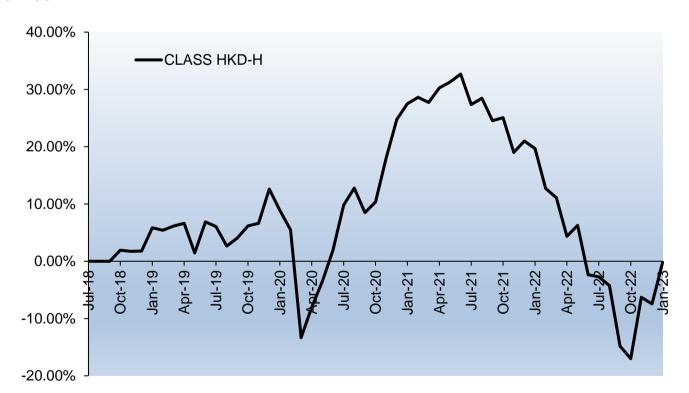

CLASS GBP-H

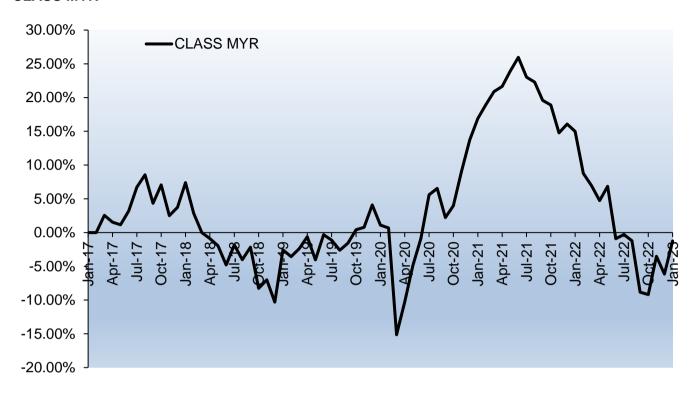

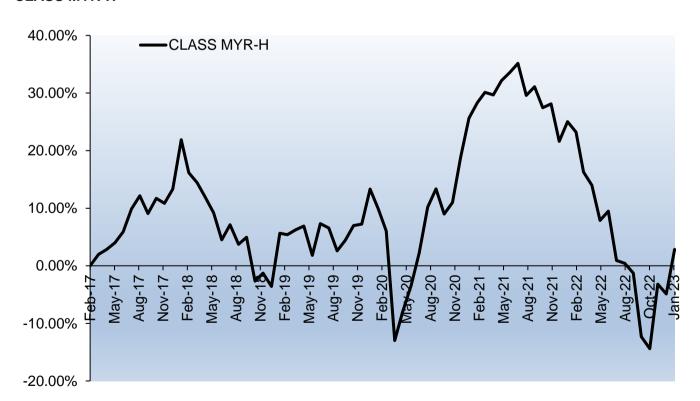

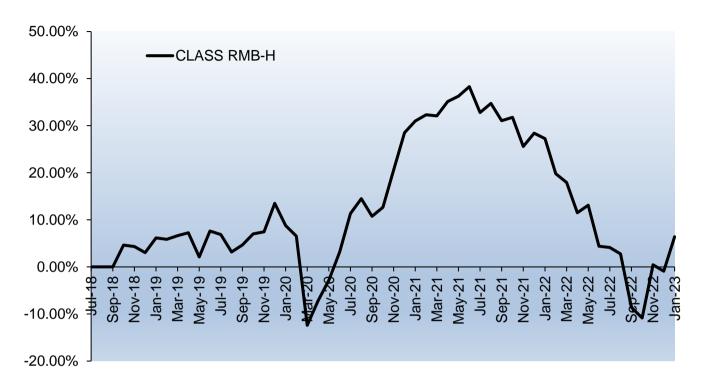

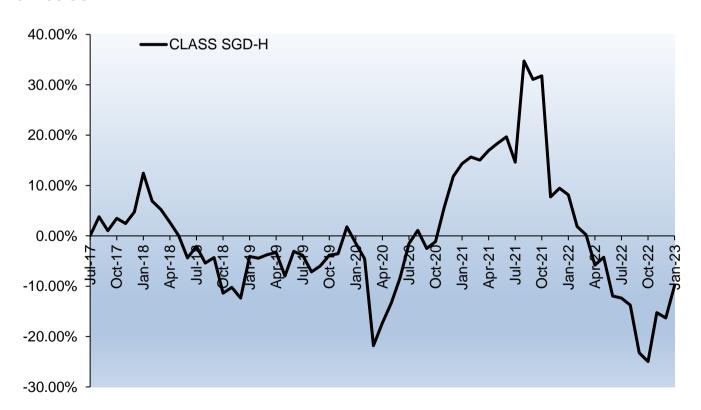

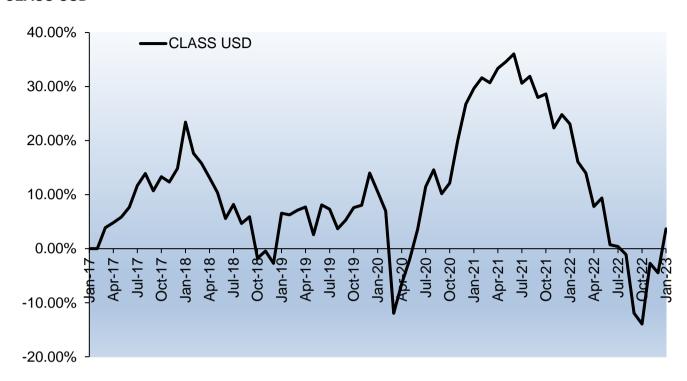

For the financial year under review, the Fund's NAV for Class AUD-H, Class MYR, Class MYR-H, Class RMB-H, Class SGD-H, and Class USD decreased by 30.37%, 36.64%, 23.61%, 32.76%, 27.70%, and 34.62% respectively due to outflows from redemptions. Meanwhile Class EUR-H, Class GBP-H, and Class HKD-H remained flat during the same financial year under review.

The Fund's NAV per unit for all classes also decreased during the financial year under review mainly due to the negative investment performance.

MARKET OUTLOOK*

We think that volatility is likely to remain a feature for at least the first half of 2023 as central banks continue to move rates upward. We continued to see indications of global disinflation, a softening US dollar and signs of increased activity in China. We opine that two of the key macro headwinds that EM debt faced in 2022—namely, a tightening in global liquidity as a function of high global inflation and the strict zero-COVID-19 policy in China—were beginning to abate.

INVESTMENT STRATEGY

The Fund will continue to remain fully invested in the Target Fund with minimal cash kept for liquidity purposes.

SOFT COMMISSIONS AND REBATES

Principal Asset Management Berhad (the "Manager") and the Trustee will not retain any form of rebate or soft commission from, or otherwise share in any commission with, any broker in consideration for directing dealings in the investments of the Principal Malaysia Funds ("Funds") unless the soft commission received is retained in the form of goods and services such as research and advisory services that assists in the decision making process relating to the Fund's investments. All dealings with brokers are executed on best available terms.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 JANUARY 2023

1. THE FUND, THE MANAGER AND ITS PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

Principal Emerging Markets Multi Asset Fund (the "Fund") is governed by a Principal Deed dated 30 December 2016, First Supplemental Deed dated 8 March 2017, Second Supplemental Deed dated 22 May 2018 and Third Supplemental Deed dated 30 December 2019 (collectively refer to as "Deeds"), made between Principal Asset Management Berhad (the "Manager") and HSBC (Malaysia) Trustee Berhad (the "Trustee").

The Fund is a feeder fund and it invests in a single collective investment scheme, i.e. the Target Fund. The Fund may also invest in liquid asset for liquidity purpose.

In order to achieve its investment objective, the Fund will invest at least 95% of its NAV in the Target Fund; a UCITS domiciled in Luxembourg and established on 23 May 2011. Currently, the Fund will invest in Class AD of the Target Fund, which is a share class denominated in USD and launched on 21 March 2013. The Fund will also maintain up to 5% of its NAV in liquid assets for liquidity purposes. The Fund may invest into any other classes of the Target Fund which must be denominated in USD if the Manager and the Target Fund Manager are of the opinion that the change is in the interest of the Unit holders.

Information on the Target Fund:

Company : AB SICAV I, an open-ended investment company with variable

capital (société d'investissement à capital variable) incorporated on 8 June 2006 with limited liability in the Grand Duchy of

Luxembourg.

Investment Manager : AllianceBernstein L.P.

Management Company : AllianceBernstein (Luxembourg) S.à r.l.

Regulatory authority : Commission de Surveillance du Secteur Financier

All investments are subjected to the Securities Commission Malaysia's ("SC") Guidelines on Unlisted Capital Market Products under the Lodge and Launch Framework, SC requirements, the Deeds, except where exemptions or variations have been approved by the SC, internal policies and procedures and the Fund's objective.

The Manager is a joint venture between Principal Financial Group®, a member of the FORTUNE 500® and a Nasdaq-listed global financial services and CIMB Group Holdings Berhad, one of Southeast Asia's leading universal banking groups. The principal activities of the Manager are the establishment and management of unit trust funds and fund management activities.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been used consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the financial statements:

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the MFRS as issued by the Malaysian Accounting Standards Board ("MASB") and IFRS as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IASB").

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by financial assets at fair value through profit or loss.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(a) Basis of preparation (continued)

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with MFRS and IFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reported year.

It also requires the Manager to exercise their judgement in the process of applying the Fund's accounting policies. Although these estimates and assumptions are based on the Manager's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results may differ.

The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed in Note 2(I).

There are no other standards, amendments to standards or interpretations that are effective for annual periods beginning on 1 February 2022 that have a material effect on the financial statements of the Fund.

There are no applicable standards, amendments to standards or interpretations that are effective for annual period beginning on/after 1 February 2023 to the financial statements of the Fund.

(b) Financial assets and financial liabilities

Classification

The Fund classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- those to be measured subsequently at fair value through profit or loss, and
- those to be measured at amortised cost.

The Fund classifies its investments based on both the Fund's business model for managing those financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets. The portfolio of financial assets is managed, and performance is evaluated on a fair value basis. The Fund is primarily focused on fair value information and uses that information to assess the assets' performance and to make decisions. The Fund has not taken the option to irrevocably designate any equity securities as fair value through other comprehensive income ("OCI").

Investments in collective investment scheme have contractual cash flows that do not represent solely payment of principal and interest, and therefore are classified as fair value through profit or loss.

The Fund classifies cash and cash equivalents, amount due from dealer and amount due from Manager as financial assets at amortised cost as these financial assets are held to collect contractual cash flows consisting of the amount outstanding.

All of the Fund's financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(b) Financial assets and financial liabilities (continued)

Recognition and measurement

Regular purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on the trade-date, the date on which the Fund commits to purchase or sell the asset. Investments are initially recognised at fair value.

Financial instruments are recognised in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Fund becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the investments have expired or have been transferred and the Fund has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership.

Financial liabilities are derecognised when it is extinguished, i.e. when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expired.

Unrealised gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value of the financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are presented in the statement of comprehensive income within net gain or loss on financial assets at fair value through profit or loss in the financial year which they arise.

Dividend income from financial assets at fair value through profit or loss is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income as part of gross dividend income when the Fund's right to receive payments is established.

Collective investment scheme is valued based on the most recent published NAV per unit or share of such collective investment scheme or, if unavailable, on the last published price of such unit or share (excluding any sales charge included in such selling price).

Financial assets at amortised cost and other financial liabilities are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Impairment for assets carried at amortised costs

The Fund measures credit risk and expected credit losses ("ECL") using probability of default, exposure at default and loss given default. The Manager considers both historical analysis and forward looking information in determining any ECL. The Manager considers the probability of default to be close to zero as these instruments have a low risk of default and the counterparties have a strong capacity to meet their contractual obligations in the near term. As a result, no loss allowance has been recognised based on 12-month ECL as any such impairment would be wholly insignificant to the Fund.

Significant increase in credit risk

A significant increase in credit risk is defined by the Manager as any contractual payment which is more than 30 days past due.

Definition of default and credit-impaired financial assets

Any contractual payment which is more than 90 days past due is considered credit impaired.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(b) Financial assets and financial liabilities (continued)

Write-off

The Fund writes off financial assets, in whole or in part, when it has exhausted all practical recovery efforts and has concluded there is no reasonable expectation of recovery. The assessment of no reasonable expectation of recovery is based on unavailability of debtor's sources of income or assets to generate sufficient future cash flows to repay the amount. The Fund may write-off financial assets that are still subject to enforcement activity. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off will result in impairment gains. There are no write-offs/recoveries during the financial year.

(c) Income recognition

Dividend income is recognised on the ex-dividend date when the right to receive payment is established.

Realised gain or loss on disposal of collective investment scheme is accounted for as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of investments, determined on a weighted average cost basis.

(d) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of the Fund are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Fund operates (the "functional currency"). The financial statements are presented in USD, which is the Fund's functional and presentation currency.

Due to mixed factors in determining the functional currency of the Fund, the Manager has used its judgement to determine the functional currency that most faithfully represents the economic effects of the underlying transactions, events and conditions and have determined the functional currency to be in USD primarily due to the following factors:

- i) The Fund's investments are denominated in USD;
- ii) Significant portion of the cash is denominated in USD for the purpose of making settlement of the foreign trades; and
- iii) Significant portion of the Fund's expenses are denominated in USD.

Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions or valuation where items are remeasured. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at financial year-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in statement of comprehensive income.

(e) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of statement of cash flow, cash and cash equivalent comprise bank balances with known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(f) Management fee rebate

Management fee rebate is derived from the Fund's investment in collective investment scheme on an accruals basis to ensure no double charging of management fee. It is accrued daily based on the fair value of the collective investment scheme held.

(g) Distribution

A distribution to the Fund's unit holders is accounted for as distribution in the statement of comprehensive income as the unit holders' contributions are classified as financial liability as per Note 2(i). A proposed distribution is recognised as a liability in the financial year in which it is approved by the Trustee.

(h) Taxation

Current tax expense is determined according to Malaysian tax laws at the current rate based upon the taxable profit earned during the financial year.

Tax on income from foreign collective investment scheme is based on the tax regime of the respective countries that the Fund invests in.

(i) Unit holders' contributions

The unit holders' contributions to the Fund meet the definition of puttable instruments classified as financial liability under MFRS 132 "Financial Instruments: Presentation".

The Fund issues cancellable units, in nine classes of units, known respectively as the Class AUD-H, Class EUR-H, Class GBP-H, Class HKD-H, Class MYR, Class MYR-H, Class RMB-H, Class SGD-H and Class USD which are cancelled at the unit holder's option. The units are classified as financial liabilities. Cancellable units can be put back to the Fund at any time for cash equal to a proportionate share of the Fund's NAV of respective classes. The outstanding units are carried at the redemption amount that is payable at the date of the statement of financial position if the member exercises the right to put back the unit to the Fund.

Units are created and cancelled at the unit holders' option at prices based on the Fund's NAV per unit of respective classes at the close of business on the relevant dealing day. The Fund's NAV per unit of respective classes is calculated by dividing the net assets attributable to unit holders of respective classes with the total number of outstanding units of respective classes.

(j) Derivative financial instruments

A derivative financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to both a financial asset of one enterprise and a financial liability or equity instrument of another enterprise.

A financial asset is any asset that is cash, a contractual right to receive cash or another financial asset from another enterprise, a contractual right to exchange financial instruments with another enterprise under conditions that are potentially favourable, or an equity instrument of another enterprise.

A financial liability is any liability that is a contractual obligation to deliver cash or another financial asset to another enterprise, or to exchange financial instruments with another enterprise under conditions that are potentially unfavourable.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(j) Derivative financial instruments (continued)

The Fund's derivative financial instruments comprise forward foreign exchange contracts. Derivatives are initially recognised at fair value on the date a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at their fair value.

The fair value of forward foreign exchange contracts is determined using forward exchange rates at the date of statements of financial position, with the resulting value discounted back to present value.

The method of recognising the resulting gain or loss depends on whether the derivative is designated as a hedging instrument, and the nature of the item being hedged. Derivatives that do not qualify for hedge accounting are classified as held-for-trading and accounted for in accordance with the accounting policy set out in Note 2(b).

(k) Realised and unrealised portions of profit or loss after taxation.

The analysis of realised and unrealised portions of profit or loss after taxation as presented on the statement of comprehensive income is guided by SC Guidelines on Unit Trust Funds¹.

(I) Critical accounting estimates and judgements in applying accounting policies

The Fund makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, rarely equal the related actual results. To enhance the information content of the estimates, certain key variables that are anticipated to have material impact to the Funds' results and financial position are tested for sensitivity to changes in the underlying parameters.

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated by the Manager and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

In undertaking any of the Fund's investment, the Manager will ensure that all assets of the Fund under management will be valued appropriately, that is at fair value and in compliance with the SC Guidelines on Unlisted Capital Market Products under the Lodge and Launch Framework.

However, the Manager is of the opinion that in applying these accounting policies, no significant judgement was required.

¹ The presentation of the analysis of realised and unrealised portions of increase/decrease in net assets attributable to unit holders as presented on the statement of comprehensive income is provided as per the SC Guidelines on Unit Trust Funds. However, the Fund is not guided by the SC Guidelines on Unit Trust Funds.

The Fund aims to maximise total return through investments in one collective investment scheme, which invests primarily in assets of the EM.

The Fund is exposed to a variety of risks which include market risk (inclusive of price risk and currency risk), credit risk and liquidity risk.

Financial risk management is carried out through internal control process adopted by the Manager and adherence to the investment restrictions as stipulated in the Deeds and SC Guidelines on Unlisted Capital Market Products under the Lodge and Launch Framework.

(a) Market risk

(i) Price risk

Price risk is the risk that the fair value of an investment in collective investment scheme will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk and currency risk). The value of collective investment scheme may fluctuate according to the activities of individual companies, sector and overall political and economic conditions. Such fluctuation may cause the Fund's NAV and prices of units to fall as well as rise, and income produced by the Fund may also fluctuate.

The price risk is managed through diversification and selection of collective investment scheme and other financial instruments within specified limits according to the Deeds.

(c) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund will encounter difficulty in meeting its financial obligations.

The Manager manages this risk by maintaining sufficient level of liquid assets to meet anticipated payments and cancellations of the units by unit holders. Liquid assets comprise bank balances and other instruments, which are capable of being converted into cash within 7 business days. The Fund's investments in collective investment scheme are realisable which are capable of being converted into cash within 10 business days. This is expected to reduce the risks for the entire portfolio without limiting the Fund's growth potentials.

The table below summarises the Fund's financial liabilities into relevant maturity groupings based on the remaining period on the statement of financial position date to the contractual maturity date. The amounts in the table are the contractual undiscounted cash flows.

(d) Capital risk management

The capital of the Fund is represented by net assets attributable to unit holders of USD7,258,888 (2022: USD10,179,113). The amount of capital can change significantly on a daily basis as the Fund is subject to daily subscriptions and redemptions at the discretion of unit holders. The Fund's objective when managing capital is to safeguard the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern in order to provide returns to unit holders and benefits for other stakeholders and to maintain a strong capital base to support the development of the investment activities of the Fund.

(e) Fair value estimation

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date (i.e. an exit price).

The fair value of financial assets traded in active markets (such as trading securities) are based on quoted market prices at the close of trading on the financial year end date. The Fund utilises the last traded market price for financial assets where the last traded price falls within the bid-ask spread. In circumstances where the last traded price is not within the bid-ask spread, the Manager will determine the point within the bid-ask spread that is most representative of the fair value.

An active market is a market in which transactions for the asset or liability take place with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis.

The fair value of financial assets that are not traded in an active market is determined by using valuation techniques.

(i) Fair value hierarchy

The table below analyses financial instruments carried at fair value. The different levels have been defined as follows:

- Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active market for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1)
- Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (that is, as prices) or indirectly (that is, derived from prices) (Level 2)
- Inputs for the asset and liability that are not based on observable market data (that is, unobservable inputs) (Level 3)

The level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirety is determined on the basis of the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety. For this purpose, the significance of an input is assessed against the fair value measurement in its entirety.

If a fair value measurement uses observable inputs that require significant adjustment based on unobservable inputs, that measurement is a Level 3 measurement.

Assessing the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement in its entirety requires judgement, considering factors specific to the asset or liability.

Financial instruments that trade in markets that are considered to be active but are valued based on quoted market prices, dealer quotations or alternative pricing sources supported by observable inputs are classified within Level 2. These include unquoted fixed income securities, forward foreign currency contracts and interest rate swaps. As Level 2 instruments include positions that are not traded in active markets and/or are subject to transfer restrictions, valuations may be adjusted to reflect illiquidity and/or non-transferability, which are generally based on available market information.

(ii) The carrying values of cash and cash equivalents, amount due from dealer, and amount due from Manager and all other liabilities are a reasonable approximation of their fair values due to their short-term nature.

4. MANAGEMENT FEE

In accordance with the Deeds, the Manager is entitled to a maximum management fee of 3.00% per annum, calculated daily based on the NAV of the Class.

For the financial year ended 31 January 2023, the management fee is recognised at a rate of 1.80% per annum (2022: 1.80% per annum) for each class.

There was no further liability to the Manager in respect of management fee other than amounts recognised above.

5. TRUSTEE FEE

In accordance with the Deeds, the Trustee is entitled to a fee of up to 0.08% per annum of the NAV of the Fund. The Trustee fee includes local custodian fees and charges but excludes foreign sub-custodian fees and charges.

For the financial year ended 31 January 2023, the Trustee fee is recognised at a rate of 0.04% per annum (2022: 0.04% per annum) for each Fund.

There was no further liability to the Trustee in respect of Trustee fee other than amounts recognised above.
